Avocado oil regenerates skin cells, which is not what a psoriasis sufferer wants. My shampoo bar, called 'The complete Bar' is designed to be just that, shampoo and soap, able to be used on the entire body. Made with Jojoba oil that cleanses the cells and helps flush out the debris.

Whilst this soap is a shampoo bar, it has all the ingredients that could assist your skin complaint. Being shampoo, it has more coconut oil than my other bars which gives more lather (you may get through the bar quicker) and the essential oil combination is deigned to stimulate hair growth, but should have no effect on the body skin unless one sufferers from allergens, then I refer you to the ingredients to check. I believe this is the soap I directed your daughter too.

PALM OIL

This controversial crop, that is in everything from cosmetics to food and even engine lubrication.

What's so good about Palm Oil?

It's a valuable economic crop, with 1.5 million (estimated) small farmers growing it in Indonesia, due to the potential high income growing the crop has replaced traditional practices. Cash economy has resulted in improved infrastructure, with better access to schools and health facilities. Palm oil is the most profitable land use in the tropics and its income contributes to economic growth and the alleviation from rural poverty.

Unrefined Palm Oil contains 50% saturated, 40% monounsaturated, 10% polyunsaturated fats, a variety of nutrients including Vitamin A, E and antioxidants. It can be used to treat Vitamin A deficiency and hydrate famine victims in developing countries.

Negative side to Palm Oil: Land Taken

Reports up until 2012 show land has been taken without consultation or compensation from indigenous people, in Papua New Guinea, Colombia, Indonesia, Malaysian state Sabah and on the island of Borneo, Sarawak and Kailmantan, which has led directly to conflict. Palm Oil companies have been reported to use force to acquire the land. Yet the Roundtable on Sustainable Palm Oil (RSPO) set a date, Certified Sustainable Palm Oil (CSPO) comes from plantations that were established on land cleared before 2005.

Greenhouse Emmission

The plantations are replacing Virgin Rainforest, home to thousands of animals now endangered and on the brink of extinction. Cutting down the forest and clearing the land emits enormous damaging irrevocable carbon emissions into the atmosphere, accounting for 10% of manmade CO2 emissions.

Destruction of Virgin Rainforest to create Palm oil plantations

SOME FACTS - about Lash and Burn, Forest Fires and Smog

In 2015 the Indonesian government declared a state of emergency due to the smog from 'Lash and Burn', a method of clearing vegetation for Palm Oil. These forest fires, an illegal practise, often spread out of control and into protected forest areas. The fires produce a dense smog effecting the population over hundreds of kilometres as far as Thailand and the Philippines. More than 28 million people in Indonesia were effected and 140,000 reported respiratory illness. Respiratory infection, pneumonia, skin irritation, eye irritation were some of the many complaints and illnesses.

Schools were closed for days effecting 4 million students in Indonesia, Malaysia and Singapore. It was reported that the pollution cost to South East Asia was \$47 billion US dollars.

In 2016 Indonesian government made 454 arrests in connection with forest fires. Sago a plantation company was fined \$81 million US dollars. The fires caused smog so bad it led once again to school closures as well as air and sea traffic disruptions and the country went into a state of emergency, with reports of 100,000 deaths caused from respiratory illnesses.

Peat fires are the most difficult to put out, burning underground and springing up in other places months later.

Human Rights

Following investigations by Amnesty International there are reports that the adult workers have high targets, which need to be meet to earn a days pay, either work until the target is achieved or take a pay cut, many children as young as 8 work after school (some have given up on school) to help their parents keep their jobs, with woman earning as little as \$2.50 per day. Subjecting adults and their children to long hours, heavy lifting in a hazardous environment without safety equipment and exposure to chemicals. These reports come from RSPO plantations, supposedly Sustainable Palm Oil.

Did you know that Norway contributed 1 Billion Dollars to help make a transition to sustainable forestry.
Consequently Indonesia announced a 2 year suspension on new agreements to clear natural forest and peatland!

Well done Norway.

Water Pollution

The good news is Palm Oil plantations need little pesticides or fertilisers once the plant has established, only nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium are regularly applied to palm fruit trees. However, this produces sediment and harmful substances which exit via streams running through the plantations and ultimately end up in the fresh waterways.

Also for every metric tonne of Palm Oil produced, 2.5 metric tonnes of liquid waste is also produced. This sludge was disposed of through the river systems up until recently but now it has to be processed in ponds where anaerobic digestion can take place.

We can all make an effort and try not to contribute to the mass destruction Palm Oil plantations have upon our environment.

The difficulty if consuming Palm Oil products is knowing where the Palm Oil has come from. Without a proper tracking system from product to refinery to plantation (and there isn't one) it is impossible to be certain that the Palm Oil consumed has not had any effect on air or water pollution, human or animal welfare.





RUBBISH!

How much do we create? Where does it go? What are the consequences?

Where does the waste come from? - **Over 40**% of plastic waste is directly from packaging! What we eat, drink, items, gifts we buy all come in packaging, with just a small amount being recycled most ends up in landfill.

Did you know that a plastic bag has just 15 minute working life, with 14% of all rubbish being plastic bottles excluding the cap and label. #FACT

Soft Drinks companies are responsible for 16 million bottles being disposed of EACH DAY in the UK alone. #f#(f

Coffee houses send 4 billion non recycled cups to landfill every year, furthermore they acknowledge that plastic coating is used on the cups which makes it impossible to recycle. #FACT

Liffffing is the biggest cause of plastic finding its way into our seas and oceans, weather too, can move debris, wind, rain can wash blow rubbish into a stream, drain where it will end up in the sea. With plastic bottles taking 400 years to degrade in water, with 215 million metric tons of plastic ending up in our oceans and seas each year. It is shocking, by 2050 with out change plastic in oceans will out weigh fish. #Ff(f

THE SCALE OF THE PROBLEM

Once plastic is in our oceans it is there to stay, put there by humans. Never fully degrading but instead becomes brittle, breaking eroding into small pieces - micro plastics (less than 5mm in diameter) - the scale of the pollution is enormous.

On our own shores in Scotland this year a crew of scientists have been conducting a sea surface sampling of micro plastics, to establish how polluted our seas are, as plastic has been found in $\frac{1}{2}$ of all UK caught fish, which ends up on our plate. #FACT

The uninhabited island of Henderson in the South Pacific is covered with 38 million pieces of trash washed ashore by ocean currents, known as 'gyres'.

The North Pacific Gyre is home to the **Great Pacific Garbage Patch** which is approximately 270,000 square miles and 6 meters deep, 8% of the size of the Pacific Ocean, a floating island of manmade debris.

THE DIRECT EFFECT ON MARINE LIFE

To a **sea turtle** a floating plastic bag looks like a jelly fish, when ingested it causes blockages in their digestive system and eventual death.

The curious, playful seals will often play with fragments of plastic netting or packing straps. If the webbing is caught around the **seals** neck it acts as a harness and constrict the seal's movements, killing the seal through starvation, exhaustion, or infection from deep wounds caused by the tightening material.

While diving for food, **whales** can get caught in translucent nets and drown. Our own #startbay humpback whale got caught twice in whelk/lobster pots and fishing line, to be successfully freed, as the tremor could been seen from the land. A whale caught in line will strive to death or drown.

Basking sharks filter an Olympic swimming pool of water ever hour, with our seas littered with micro plastics including micro beads from cosmetic products. There feeding is causing them to consume and ingest vast amounts of plastic.

Sea birds, ingest plastic sometimes feeding micro plastics mistakenly to their young, they can also become entangled in the debris floating in our oceans and seas and even use bits of plastic for their nests.

MY SMALL CONTRIBUTION

There are many more initiatives that individuals are taking to combat this global problem, perhaps the most effective method right now for solving the persistent plastic problem is beach cleaning. This is what I discovered and did on the little island of **Dun Ghanian**, **Loch Sunart**.

My partner and I paddled to a little island called Dun Ghanian home to an old forte, now home to otter's and red deer and approximately 1400 square metres. Upon discovering a small beach full of washed up rubbish we decided to pick it up, we cleaned the entire beach, as well as walking around this small island collecting even more plastic. On our return we discovered we had collected a wheelbarrow full of plastic and ghost line. Now deposited into the correct waste stream!

A week later we returned and litter picked the opposite mainland coast line, finding too much to carry back on the kayaks, we have collected the waste in one central point and will visit with every opportunity remove as much as we can carry.

Even if plastic production halted tomorrow, the planet would be dealing with its environmental consequences for thousands of years.

Think about what you buy, what is the packaging, how can it be disposed of, choose a product for its environmental conscience. Never litter, always take home what you brought and more, litter pick where ever you go.
