

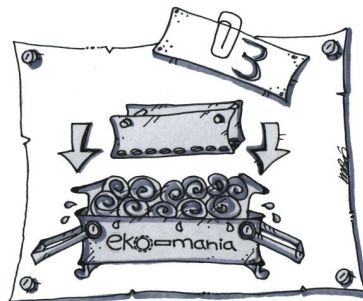


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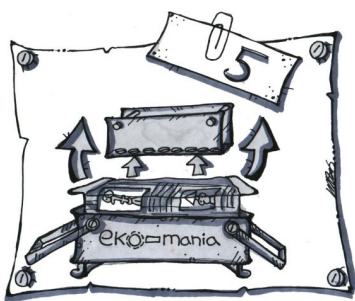
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Tear or shred the paper, and place in a bucket of water - stirring occasionally.

The soaking of the paper takes one hour minimum with lots of agitation, a few days being optimal. It really depends on the volume of the container, the temperature and materials being used. Soaking for more than 10 days can lead to bacterial problems.



When the paper is coming apart, fill the log maker and press down the handles to squeeze out excess moisture - within moments you have created a paper briquette!



Remove the briquette from the press

Leave them out to dry before burning

Its best to make the briquette in the Summer months, and store them up for the Winter

TIP: They will dry out in a week in a greenhouse
